

Anna Procyk received M.A., the Harriman Institute Certificate (1967) as well as Ph.D. (1973) from Columbia University where she specialized in Russian and East European history. She held research positions at Columbia University, Harvard University and taught courses in European and Russian history in New York State and Connecticut. Before her retirement in 2018, she was professor of history at Kingsborough Community College of the City University of New York. She is an active participant in scholarly associations, serves on the Executive Board of the Ukrainian Academy of Arts and Sciences in New York and the Shevchenko Scientific Society in America. For the past two decades she has been a member of the Advisory Committee of the Columbia University Ukrainian Studies Program. She is the author of two monographs: *Russian Nationalism and Ukraine: the Nationality Policy of the Volunteer Army during the Civil War* (1995) and *Giusseppe Mazzini's Young Europe and the Birth of Modern Nationalism in the Slavic World* (2019). She is also the editor and translator of *Two Worlds One Idea: Ten Years of Correspondence between Amnesty International, Group 11 and a Ukrainian Political Prisoner, Zinovii Krasivskyj* (2013) and contributor to scholarly journals on this continent and in Europe. In 2020 she was awarded the prestigious Kovaliv prize for scholarship.
