

Victor Satzewich is Professor of Sociology at McMaster University and is currently the Fulbright Canada Research Chair in Peace and War Studies at Norwich University, Vermont. He was a United Kingdom Commonwealth Scholar and received his PhD from the University of Glasgow, Scotland in 1988. He has published extensively on immigration and race and ethnic relations in Canada. His books include *Racism and the Incorporation of Foreign Labour: Farm Labour Migration to Canada Since 1945* (Routledge, 1991); *The Ukrainian Diaspora* (Routledge, 2002); *Racism in Canada* (Oxford University Press, 2006); *Points of Entry: How Canada's Visa Officers Decide Who Gets In* (University of British Columbia Press, 2015); *'Race' and Ethnicity in Canada: A Critical Perspective*, (Oxford University Press, 5th edition, 2021); and *The Vietnamese Diaspora: Contested Spaces, Contested Narratives* (Brill, 2022, co-edited with Anna Vu). His book *Points of Entry* won the John Porter Tradition of Excellence Book Prize from the Canadian Sociological Association. He was awarded the Distinguished Contributions Award by the Canadian Sociological Association in 2007; in 2020 he was awarded the Metropolis Canada Award for Research Excellence. Among his current research projects is a study, with Natalia Khanenko-Friesen (University of Alberta) and Monica Hwang (University of Saskatchewan), of the settlement trajectories of post-1991 immigrants from Ukraine to Canada.
